As of January 2014 and for the next five years, Vance-Granville Community College is "Living the Vision."

The Vision is a strategic plan developed with input from Vance-Granville's students, employees and the broader community served by the college.

Shortly after taking the reins as VGCC's president in 2012, Dr. Stelfanie Williams pulled together a team of college faculty and staff to develop the framework for a strategic plan to carry the college through its 50th anniversary in 2019.

The results were the Mission Statement and Vision Statement that guide the college in its focus and activities as well as nine core Values and 20 specific Goals built around five overarching areas of focus.

The college's Board of Trustees officially adopted the Vanguard Vision on June 15, 2013, and implementation of the strategic plan began in January 2014.

Pomp, Circumstance & 'Being Faithful'

Vance-Granville Community College's 430 graduates at the 45th commencement exercises heard much applause but also were challenged with some words of wisdom from a United States Congressman.

U.S. Rep. G.K. Butterfield, who represents North Carolina's first district in the U.S. House of Representatives, urged graduates to "be faithful."

Addressing graduates, family and friends and the college faculty and staff, the congressman first urged graduates to be faithful to VGCC.

"The North Carolina Community College System is one of the best systems in the country," the congressman said. "You should understand the role that the state government has played in providing this opportunity, and you should advocate for the continuation of a

strong community college system.

"I also want you to be faithful to your family," he said. "You would not be sitting in those seats if not for your family and their sacrifices...."

"I want you to be faithful to humanity. Half of the world lives on less than \$2 per day. In our beloved country, 45 million live in poverty.... Be faithful to other people around the world and in your community who need your attention."

Finally, he said, "be faithful to yourself. Education without character is a very dangerous combination." His prescription for good character included being honest and trustworthy, while demonstrating integrity, reliability and responsibility.

The ceremony was held at the gazebo by the lake on the college's Main Campus.

VGCC approves curriculum programs in Gerontology, Computer Technology

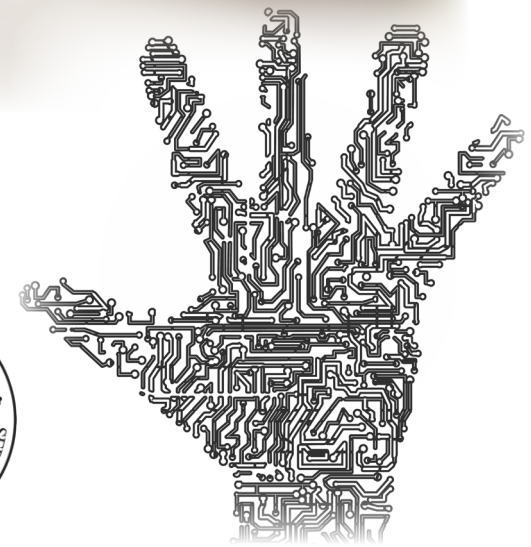
A concentration in Gerontology added to the Human Services Technology program and the approval of a Computer Technology Integration program were among the advancements in Curriculum and Continuing Education opportunities Vance-Granville during 2013-2014. The two programs were approved as three other new programs began taking their first students.

The **Gerontology** concentration prepares students to specialize in direct service delivery to aging adults and their families. VGCC is one of only six North Carolina community colleges approved to offer the program.

The new **Computer Technology Integration** program offers a new, more flexible format for preparing students for information technology careers, serving as an umbrella that includes three degree tracks: **CTI-IT Support**, **CTI-Networking and Security Technologies**, and **CTI-Web Design and Support**.

The **Pharmacy Technology** program expanded by adding a new option for students to earn an Associate in Applied Science degree in the field. VGCC added the **Paralegal Technology** program to prepare individuals to work under the supervision of attorneys by assisting with legal work. Offered in collaboration with Wake Technical Community College, the **Simulation and Game Development** curriculum provides a background in creative arts, visual arts, audio-video technology, creative writing, modeling, design, programming and management.

Also, VGCC students now enjoy a smoother pathway to completing a four-year degree with a new Comprehensive Articulation Agreement between the N.C. Community College System and the University of North Carolina System. On Feb. 21, members of the State Board of Community Colleges and the UNC Board of Governors signed the revision.



First two-year degrees awarded in Pharmacy

History was made in May 2014 as Vance-Granville Community College honored 19 students who have completed the Pharmacy Technology program. The honorees were the very first students to complete a two-year degree in Pharmacy Tech at VGCC. Dr. Stelfanie Williams, the college president, told students, family and friends at a pinning ceremony, "All of our students who complete their academic programs deserve recognition, but it is especially exciting to acknowledge the achievements of pioneering students like you."

Vance-Granville Community College recognized a record-high 55 students who graduated this spring from the Associate Degree Nursing program with a pinning ceremony in the college's Civic Center on May 14. Among those honored with distinctive nursing pins at the ceremonies were seven who graduated through the LPN to ADN Transition Program, which helps Licensed Practical Nurses to continue their education and then become Registered Nurses.

Despite struggling to pass his last test, he completed the High School Equivalency program in December 2013, just before the expiration of

the previous version of the GED test. "This high school diploma has already opened the door for me to attend a culinary arts school in Kentucky," Williams said.

He was joined at the podium by N.C. Rep. Bobbie Richardson, right, a retired educator who represents parts of Franklin and Nash counties in the Legislature. As the principal speaker at the May 8 graduation in the Civic Center, she applauded the graduates for making education a priority.

Students served up their own inspiration as VGCC observed its annual celebration of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., holiday on Jan. 15 in the college's Civic Center. Among the contributions from students, faculty and staff members, John Britton II, a Radiography student from Durham, shown in the center of the photo at left, won first place for his poem, "Interpretation of the Dream." Bria Perry of Bunn, a Franklin County Early College High School student, shown at left, placed second for her speech, which concluded with her singing a verse of a spiritual. VGCC President Dr. Stelfanie Williams, at right, in her opening remarks, noted, "Dr. King would have been 85 years old today. It's fitting that an educational institution like ours, which was created to open the doors of opportunity for all, would honor a man who believed deeply in expanding access to the American dream." Roberta Scott, coordinator of the VGCC Adult High School Diploma program, was guest speaker. She was a participant in the 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, where Dr. King delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech. "It was a hot day in August, and oftentimes when it's hot, people get upset, but the throngs of people marched peacefully, chanting and singing joyously through the nation's capital," she recalled. "To have been an active part of historic change, led in peace and nonviolence by Dr. King, was awe-inspiring." She encouraged all attendees to advance King's dream through "service to all mankind."



Awarding student leadership

DAVID A. HENRY of Macon, a College Transfer student, left, was nominated by VGCC for the North Carolina Community College System's distinguished Gov. Robert W. Scott Student Leadership Award for his academic and leadership achievements. The award was established in 2004 in honor of Scott, who served as Governor of North Carolina from 1969-1973 and as President of the N.C. Community College System from 1983-1995. Henry has been an active student leader, serving as president of the Male Mentoring program, president of the Phi Beta Lambda student organization, vice president of the Student Government Association, and as a student ambassador.

Early College student realizes her dream for better life with diploma, 2 degrees in 4 years

“I realized that I had been given the opportunity of a lifetime,” Martha Yosmara Garcia Cervantes of Creedmoor says as she reflects on her success in the Granville Early College High School and at Vance-Granville Community College.

When she graduated from Vance-Granville Community College on May 16, 2014, she received two college degrees days before she was actually awarded her high school diploma. To this young lady, the accomplishment is a reminder that America is indeed the “land of opportunity.”

Born in Mexico, Garcia Cervantes was young when her family came to the U.S. in search of a better life. “As the youngest of three children of a poor immigrant family, the odds were not in my favor,” she recalled. “It is not easy to learn a new language or to adapt to a new culture; however, it is not impossible.”

Learning the language might have been the easiest part. She did poorly in school at first, but came to realize that education would be the key to living the life that her parents had sacrificed to give her. As she completed middle school, Garcia Cervantes was accepted into GEHS, a partnership of VGCC and the Granville County Schools system.

“Seeing that my friends had not yet realized that an education was important, I had to go and represent my heritage. I had to show everyone that it is possible to achieve greatness and that I was going to be the living proof of it.”

She excelled in the classroom, ranking in the top five of her class each year of high school, and she made the VGCC Dean’s List. Garcia Cervantes was the only member of her class graduating with not one but two college transfer degrees from VGCC: an Associate in Arts and an Associate in Science.

She was named VGCC’s nominee for the N.C. Community College System’s Dallas Herring Achievement Award established to honor the late Dr. Dallas Herring, the longtime State Board of Education chairman and one of the state’s earliest advocates of community colleges. Each year, the award recognizes a community college student or alumnus who best embodies Herring’s philosophy of “taking people where they are and carrying them as far as they can go.”

For her part, Garcia Cervantes says that “Vance-Granville has carried me very far. From the very first class I took, I knew that I was going places with VGCC.” Now, she is pursuing a career in medicine, and success appears sure.



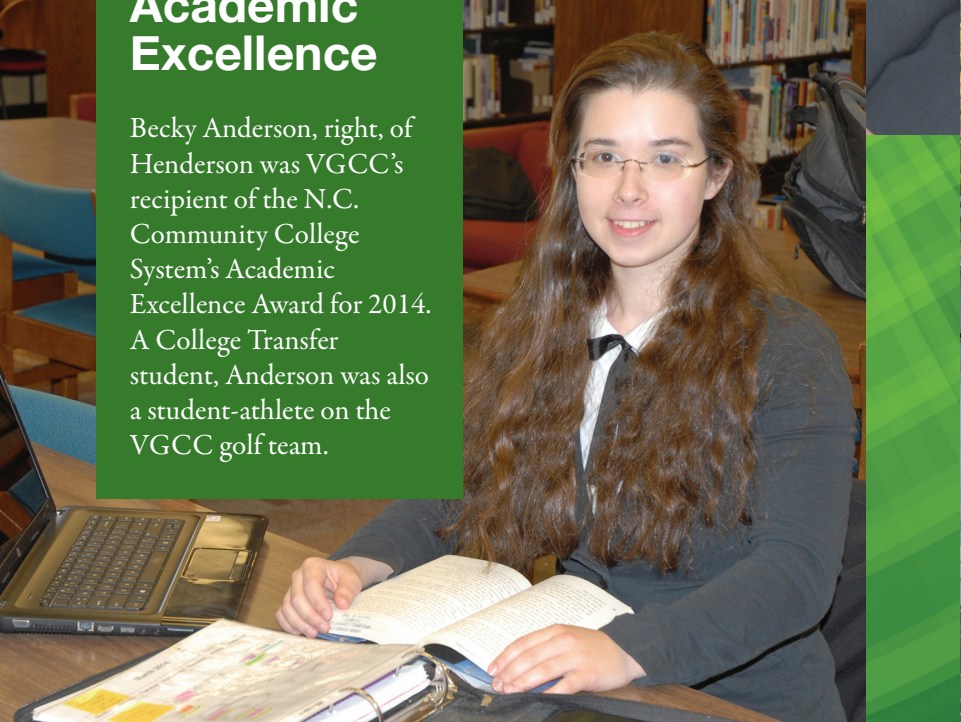
VGCC's students step up as officers, Ambassadors

VGCC improves security with first police chief

Sean Newton, shown with his wife and children, took the oath of office on Oct. 28, 2013, as the first Chief of Police for VGCC's new campus police department. The ceremonial swearing-in, administered by N.C. District Court Judge Randolph Baskerville, was held in the Civic Center on Main Campus.

Newton had served as VGCC's Director of Public Safety since 2008 and officially became Chief of Police in late July, following approval by the N.C. Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission.

The chief oversees the college's sworn law enforcement officers in addition to the staff of security guards serving all four campuses.

Promoting campus safety is among the goals of the college's "Vanguard Vision" strategic plan, noted VGCC President Dr. Stelfanie Williams. "This historic ceremony is a symbol of that commitment to public safety," she said. "As a college, we serve our community, hand-in-hand with our local law enforcement agencies."



Institute benefits faculty leadership

In the spring and summer of 2014, Director of Leadership and Professional Development Jeffrey Allen organized a Department Chairs & Program Heads Institute for VGCC's leaders. At the institute's last session, VGCC President Dr. Stelfanie Williams addressed the participants and urged them to align their personal missions with the VGCC mission of educating, inspiring and supporting our students. "You have one leg in the classroom and the other leg in helping to lead your departments into the future," the president told them. "You play a pivotal role because you touch students, the administration and the community."



GRANTS

VGCC has best year ever for education funding

Vance-Granville Community College enjoyed a record-breaking year in securing grant funding, with eight grants awarded in 2013-2014, representing more than \$2.6 million to be used over the coming years to support institutional goals.

TAACCCT Grant **\$1,757,299**

The single largest competitive grant award received in VGCC's history, the Trade Adjustment Assistance Community College and Career Training (TAACCCT) Grant was awarded by the U.S. Department of Labor as part of \$12,665,720 in funding to the Southeastern Economic and Education Leadership Consortium, a partnership of six colleges led by Pellissippi State Community College in Tennessee. The grant will support the development of innovative training programs for advanced manufacturing careers.

Golden LEAF Essential Skills in Advanced Manufacturing Grant **\$460,000**

The Golden LEAF Foundation awarded this grant to support the Manufacturing Skills Training Alliance, a workforce training partnership involving VGCC and the Career and Technical Education high school programs from Vance County Schools, Granville County Schools, Franklin County Schools and Warren County Schools.



NC Back-to-Work Grant **\$120,000**

This grant was awarded by the State Board of Community Colleges to implement a program designed to help the long-term unemployed obtain the training they need to successfully start new careers. Participants will gain skills needed in manufacturing and will earn a "Certified Production Technician" credential.

Duke Energy Foundation Grant \$245,923

Grant funds will be used to purchase state-of-the-art equipment for the VGCC Advanced Manufacturing Skills Center, which will train workers who can operate, troubleshoot, and maintain today's industrial equipment.

Minority Male Mentoring Grant \$20,500

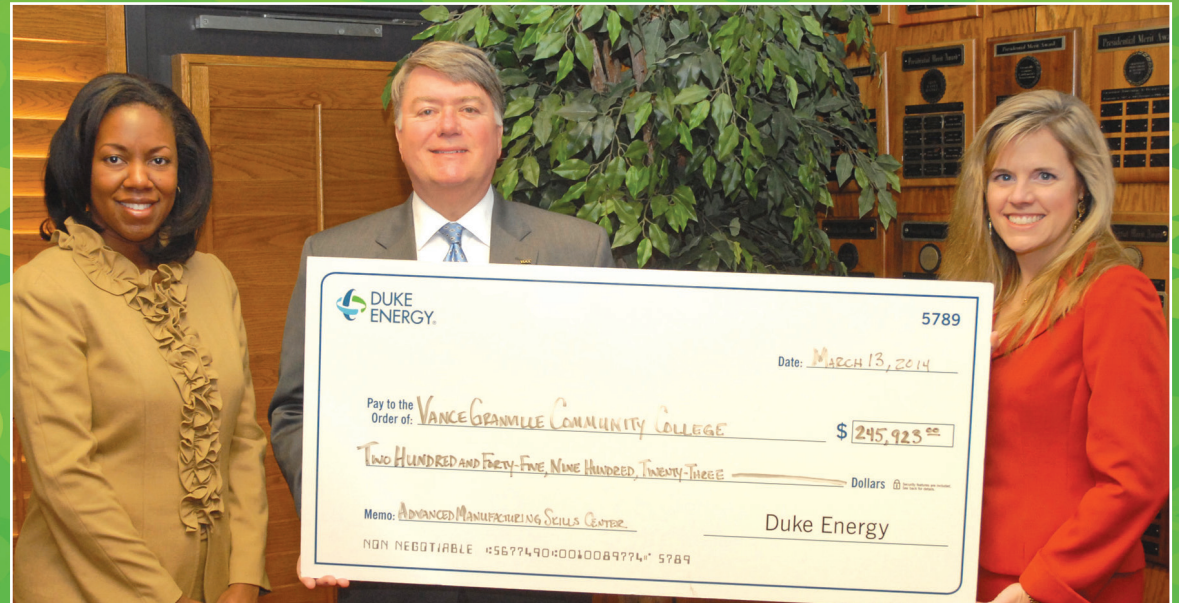
The N.C. Community College System's Minority Male Mentoring Program (3MP), supported by appropriations from the N.C. General Assembly and by a federal College Access Challenge Grant, awarded funds to implement an active, intensive, and engaging process of academic coaching and case management.

Project Skill-UP Grant \$20,000

This grant, funded by the North Carolina Tobacco Trust Fund Commission, will help qualified students with customized training programs that include Human Resources Development courses and short-term occupational training programs.

Plus 50 Encore Completion Program Grant \$15,000

This grant from the American Association of Community Colleges will assist VGCC in efforts to enhance and expand workforce training and support services to students aged 50 and over who are training for jobs in health care, education and social services.

AAUW Campus Action Project Grant \$5,000

The American Association of University Women awarded this grant for a Campus Action Project called "An Educated Woman, An Educated Future." The project is designed to inspire VGCC women students to follow through with their plans to transfer to a four-year university or college and complete a bachelor's degree.

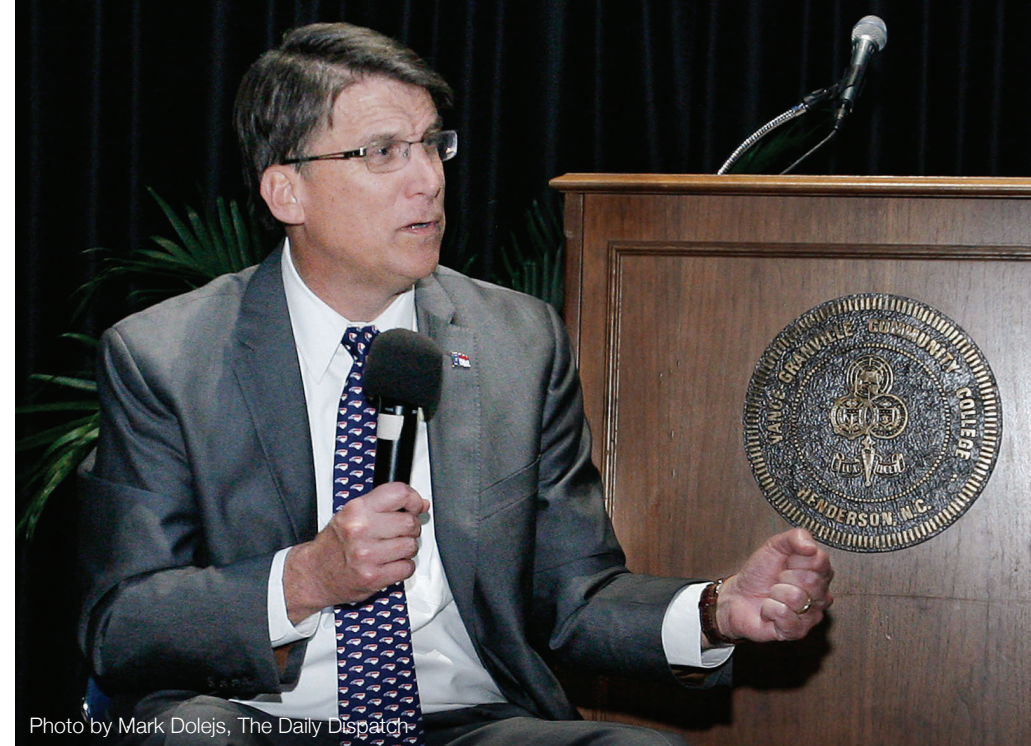

Gov. Pat McCrory on campus

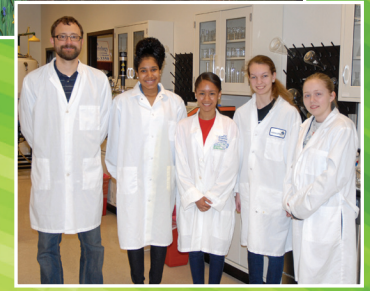

Nationally known author touts 'Completion Agenda'

Dr. Terry O'Banion, left, president emeritus and senior league fellow for the League for Innovation in the Community College, spoke to VGCC staff and faculty on the relationship of academic advising to the "Completion Agenda" at the January 2014 convocation. A national movement is underway to double the number of students who earn a certificate or associate's degree, or transfer to a four-year college by the year 2020. "For the first

100 years of their history, community colleges focused on the democratic ideal of 'access' to higher education," O'Banion said. "In our second 100 years, we are moving on to focus on student 'success,' or completion, and North Carolina is one of the leading states in the Completion Agenda." VGCC, he noted, has already made a strong commitment to student success in the college's new "Vanguard Vision" strategic plan.



Doing camp at VGCC

VGCC's fourth annual Science Camps in June gave local middle school students numerous opportunities not only to "learn" science, but to "do" science. A total of 32 middle school students from Vance, Granville, Franklin and Warren counties completed the day camp, which was held on the college's Main Campus. The week was full of fun, hands-on activities designed to pique students' curiosity about the natural sciences as they consider their future educational and career aspirations. At the various sessions, taught by VGCC instructors from several different departments, campers could be found building a Morse code generator, searching for minerals, dissecting frogs and fetal pigs, making and flying kites, testing water quality, growing bean sprouts, building bluebird houses, making lip balm, studying electricity and electronics, and collecting and analyzing the microbes that live all around them. The camp is one of several sponsored by the Arts & Sciences division including sessions on bioprocess technology and drama, shown above at right, and creative writing.

Glen Raven Excellence in Teaching and Leadership Winners

Melissa Ayscue of Henderson, at the time executive assistant for the division of Institutional Research and Technology, was named Staff Member of the Year for 2013-14. 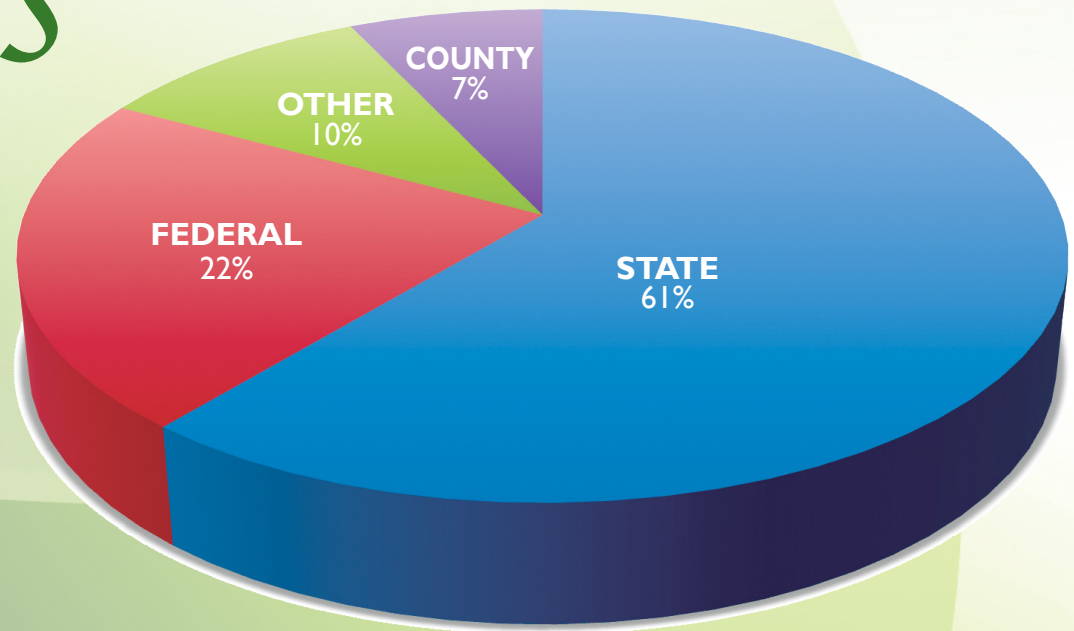

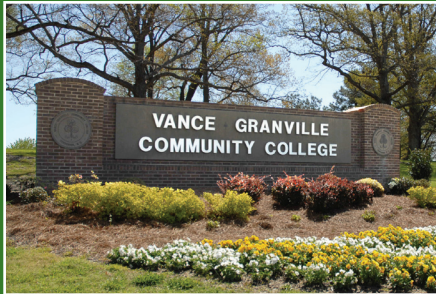
