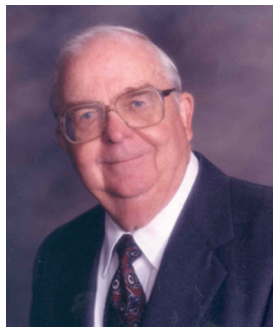

Board Approves Early College Programs

The VGCC Board of Trustees voted on Jan. 28, 2008 to offer Early College high school programs in conjunction with Vance County and Warren County public schools. The Early College program will allow high school students to take both high school and college-level credit classes. At the end of a five-year period, students will graduate with both a high school diploma and either a two-year college degree or two years of college-transfer credit.

International Speakers Series

On Oct. 24, 2007, the college kicked off an International Speakers Series, co-sponsored by the VGCC Global Awareness Committee and the University of North Carolina's World View program, with a presentation by North Carolina State University professor Dr. Roland F. Stephen. The series continued on April 16, 2008 with T. Frank Crigler, who has served as the United States ambassador to both Rwanda and Somalia.

At VGCC's 2007 fall convocation, President Randy Parker announced several awards to outstanding VGCC employees, collectively known as the Glen Raven Excellence in Teaching and Leadership Awards.

Curtis Tyndall was named VGCC's Staff Member of the Year. As Coordinator of Public Services, Tyndall has been responsible for administering training programs in fire, rescue, Emergency Medical Services and code enforcement since 1996. Tyndall is also a VGCC graduate, having completed his Associate in Arts degree at the college in 2000.

Lydia Powell, head of VGCC's psychology program, was the college's Faculty Member of the Year. A full-time VGCC instructor for the past 25 years, Powell earned bachelor's degrees in psychology and education from Wake Forest University, and a master's degree in Clinical Psychology from North Carolina Central University.

Parker also presented President's Leadership Awards to Dean of Adult Basic Education Leo Kelly, Jr., Vice President of Information Technology Kenneth Lewis, Jr., Senior Systems Administrator Vickie S. Watkins, and Dean of Prison Education Philip White.

Leo Kelly has worked at VGCC since 1971 and is currently serving as Dean of Adult Basic Education and

in Agronomy and in Curriculum and Instruction at N.C. State University.

head of the English as a Second Language program. He earned a B.A. at North Carolina Central University and a master's degree from North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University.

Dr. Ken Lewis came to VGCC in 2000 to serve as Director of Information Technology, and was later named Vice President of Information Technology in 2005. He graduated from Nash Community College in 1991 and holds bachelor's and master's degrees from East Carolina University, and a Ph.D. in Technology Management from Indiana State University.

Vickie Watkins took classes at the college as a high school student through the dual enrollment program and later completed associate's degrees in both Electronic Data Processing and Accounting at VGCC. Watkins worked at the college part-time before becoming a full-time employee in the Information Technology department in 1984.

Philip White oversaw Prison Education, including instructional programs for inmates at federal and state correctional facilities, at VGCC from 1998 through 2008. A United States Army veteran, White earned a bachelor's degree at Western Carolina University in 1974, and degrees

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

VGCC plays a vital role in the economic development of the four-county area. Among the college's many economic development partnerships is Triangle North (formerly the Kerr-Tar Hub), a regional project that includes an industrial/business park along both sides of Interstate 85, adjacent to VGCC's main campus.

In addition to the opportunities for instruction offered through VGCC's curriculum programs, Vance-Granville offers specific programs tailored to provide assistance to local businesses and government agencies. The N.C. Department of Correction and VGCC signed a training consortium agreement on Aug. 21, 2007 that brought more than 800 state Division of Prisons employees to the college for training. The VGCC consortium involves Polk Correctional Institution in Butner, Umstead Correctional Center in Butner and Warren Correctional Institution in Manson.

Another VGCC service, Focused Industry Training (FIT), is designed for specific groups of workers who need additional skills and technical knowledge and also for workers who need to update their skills because of technological changes.

Vance-Granville's four campuses provide centralized locations for various gatherings. The busiest facility on Main Campus is the Civic Center, host to a variety of events such as EXPO, which is organized by VGCC's Small Business Center and local chambers of commerce. About 900 people browsed through booths set up by 69 vendors at the 18th annual EXPO, held in October 2007. In 2007-2008, over 35,000 people from outside the college attended activities in the Civic Center.

TRAVELING ABROAD

For the fourth consecutive summer, Vance-Granville Community College sent an instructor overseas in 2008. In June, Biology instructor Nikole Jorgensen Zidar traveled to the west African nation of Senegal. She was one of 35 educators on an expedition organized by World View, an international program for educators based at UNC-Chapel Hill.

One of the primary goals of each World View trip is for North Carolina educators to learn about different educational systems and methods around the world. Zidar visited educational programs for children from age 3 through high school, a business college and the University Cheikh Anta Diop (in the capital, Dakar), where the group was housed.

While the primary focus of the

educators was Senegal's education system, Zidar also enjoyed examining local animal life (including an African spurred tortoise) and plants (such as the Baobab, the national tree). In addition, the group visited mosques, markets and the so-called "Serpent Island," which, Zidar was disappointed to learn, did not actually have many snakes.

Zidar reflected that she was "awed by the intelligence, the dedication, the hospitality, and the overall feeling of respect the Senegalese show for themselves and for other people and cultures." She found that Senegal and the United States have more in common than she had expected. "This has been an exceptional trip, and I feel that I have grown tremendously as a person, as a teacher, and as an American!" she said.

During the 2007-08 year, Vance-Granville Community College looked to the future and made plans for growth.

The VGCC Board of Trustees gave its final approval to a Facilities Master Plan on March 17, 2008. This document outlines the college's space needs and possibilities for expansion over the next ten years. The plan envisions new construction on each of the college's four campuses, as well as the possible construction of two new facilities apart from the current campuses.

"This is a very exciting time for Vance-Granville," President Randy Parker said. "Through our planning process, we are studying the needs of our area and considering the opportunities that the col-

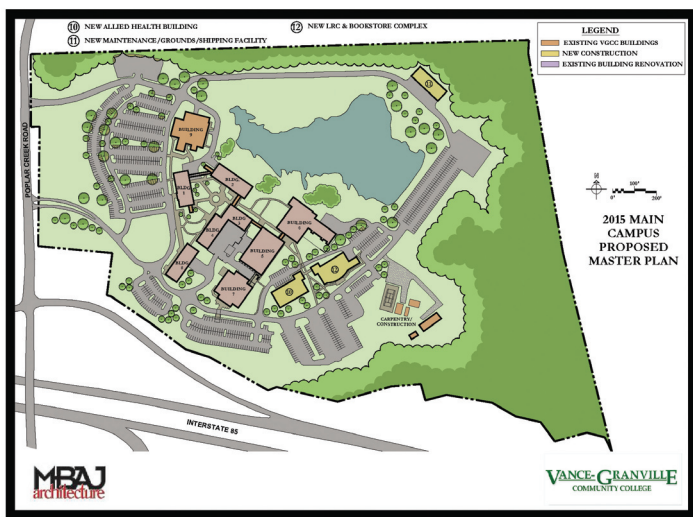

lege may have to meet those needs in the future."

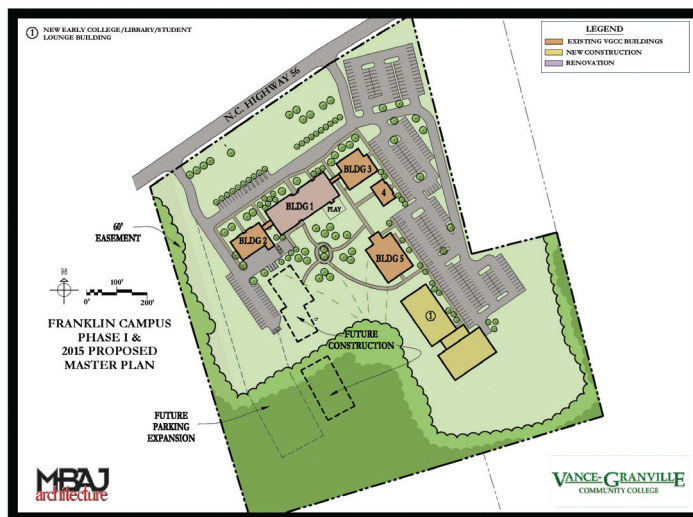
The master plan is the result of a process that began in 2006. In October 2006, VGCC contracted with MBAJ Architecture of Raleigh to prepare a facilities utilization study and campus master plan for the college. Working with MBAJ Architecture on the project was Barnhardt & Associates, Inc.

The Board of Trustees deter-

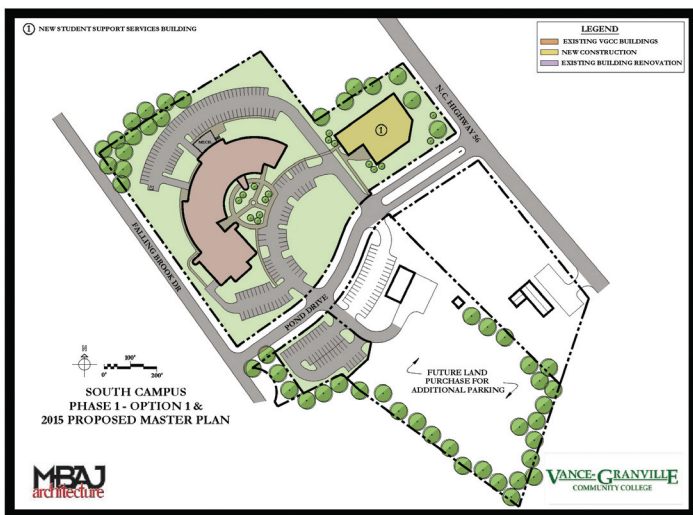
mined in May that the top three priorities for the college's growth would be construction of a new Allied Health classroom/lab building and the renovation of Buildings 5 and 6 on Main Campus; construction of a Corporate Education Center at a location to be determined; and renovations of Building 1 and construction of a new classroom/library building, both at the Franklin County Campus.



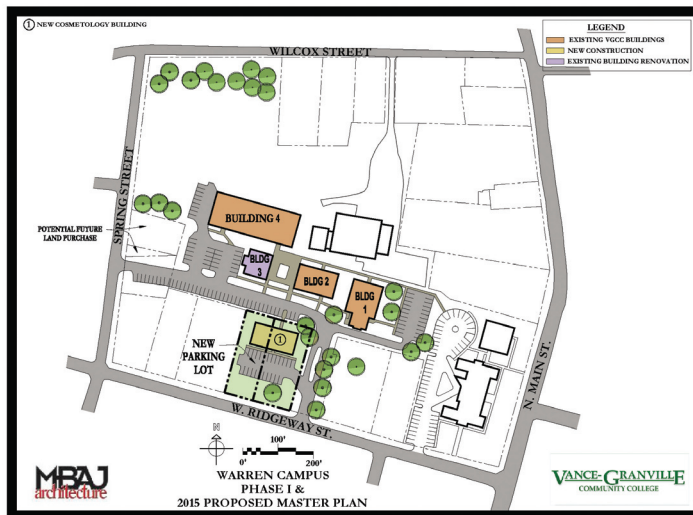

Since 1969, Vance-Granville Community College has grown from a handful of employees working in renovated quarters of a Henderson hospital and other community locations into a four-campus institution that serves thousands of students and supports economic development in Vance, Granville, Warren and Franklin counties. While the success of the college is the result of the work of countless students, faculty and staff members, leadership from the presidents of VGCC has been essential.

Dr. Donald R. Mohorn became the first permanent president of Vance County Technical Institute in August of 1969, almost five years after community leaders first began advocating for the creation of a technical college in Henderson. Mohorn, a Halifax County native and former agriculture teacher, was a graduate of a North Carolina State University program designed to

prepare new community college leaders. Mohorn led the new institution as it faced numerous

challenges: cultivating public support, developing the first curriculum programs, hiring the first employees and moving into its first permanent quarters, the old Maria Parham Hospital building in Henderson. In 1972, Mohorn, along with college trustees and others, successfully convinced voters in Vance and Granville counties to support a \$2 million bond referendum for

a larger, more permanent facility to educate citizens of both counties. Meanwhile, the institution worked to gain community college status. The result was the construction and subsequent opening of the new Vance-Granville Community College campus in 1976. In 1977, VGCC was fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools for the first time. When Mohorn left VGCC in 1979, the school's annual budget had grown from \$120,000 to more than \$2.5 million. He also laid the foundation for the college's successful Endowment Fund when he established a fund to receive gifts to the college from H. Dermont Hedrick of Oxford. Mohorn served as chairman of the Endowment Fund's first Board of Directors.

Dr. Thomas B. Carroll was selected by the Board of Trustees to succeed Mohorn, and he assumed his duties on Sept. 4, 1979. A Raleigh native, Carroll had worked at five community colleges before coming to Vance-Granville, and at the time of his hiring was the executive dean and executive vice president of Daytona Beach Community College in Florida. Carroll resigned after nine months in office.

Dr. Ben F. Currin, a Granville County native, assumed the VGCC presidency on Feb. 1, 1981 after having served as a public school administrator, including 11 years as superintendent of Rocky Mount City Schools. Under Currin's lengthy tenure, new curriculum programs, including Associate Degree Nursing, were added to meet the changing demands of the workplace, and partnerships with area high schools were established. Three new campuses extended the college's reach: South

Campus in Granville County (1982), the Warren County Campus (1988) and the Franklin County Campus (1991). Meanwhile, Main Campus was significantly enhanced by the construction of the Student Admissions-Skills Training Center (Building 8), the Small Business/Civic Center (Building 9) and a classroom/day care facility (Building 6). The college's enrollment increased, even when VGCC switched from the quarter system to the semester system in 1997. Other North Carolina colleges had experienced declining enrollment when they made that change. To make college more affordable for students, Currin reinvigorated the Endowment Fund, which grew by leaps and bounds during his presidency. The fund contained \$12,000 in 1982, and passed the \$1 million mark in 1994. An annual golf tournament to benefit the Endowment Fund and Scholarship Program began in 1985. In 1989, Currin was named one of the 18 "best of the best" community college presidents in the nation.

Robert A. Miller worked as a teacher and administrator under Ben Currin in Halifax County and Rocky Mount, and when Currin became president of VGCC, Miller was not far behind. He was eventually promoted to vice president in 1995, and when Currin announced his retirement in 1998, Miller was chosen from more than 50 applicants to succeed his mentor. With his intimate knowledge of VGCC, Miller continued to move the college forward as enrollment grew and new programs were added in technology and health sciences. Technological improvements were also seen in the first online classes and in state-of-the-art college facilities. The college embarked on a series of major construction

and renovation projects on all four campuses after state voters approved a bond in 2000. The Endowment Fund continued to grow, topping the \$5 million mark during Miller's presidency. Miller retired in 2004, after 35 years in North Carolina education, 21 of them at Vance-Granville.

Randy Parker became President of VGCC on September 1, 2004. A product of the North Carolina Community College System, Parker began his higher education at Lenoir Community College in Kinston, where he would one day serve as a vice president. In 1972, Parker earned an associate in applied science degree in Drafting & Design from LCC. He then earned a bachelor's degree in Engineering Technology from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte and a master's degree in Mechanical Engineering from N.C. State University. Parker began his career at LCC as an instructor in Engineering Technology in 1981. During his long career in community colleges, Parker has received National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development Excellence in Teaching and Leadership Awards in 2003 and 2004. Since becoming president, Parker has reorganized the college, completed the series of construction projects that began under President Miller, initiated a male mentoring program and strengthened partnerships with businesses, educational institutions and other organizations. He has also been active in community organizations, including the Henderson/Vance Economic Partnership; Franklin County Committee of 100; Chambers of Commerce in Vance, Granville, Franklin and Warren counties; the Henderson Kiwanis Club; and the Oxford Rotary Club.
